


BRANDYWINE VALLEY QUILTERS May 2019 Block of the Month Strip-Pieced Path through the Garden



12 ¹/2 inch unfinished 12 inch finished Fabrics:

Use one solid coral fabric, one small pink floral print and one small yellow floral print.



Cutting:

- 4 3 ½ inch x 3 ½ inch squares from coral solid fabric for letter A
- 1 3 ½ x 3 ½ inch square from yellow floral print for letter B
- 1 6 ½ inch x 3 ½ inch rectangle from yellow floral print for letter C
- 1 9 ½ inch x 3 ½ inch rectangle from yellow floral print for letter D
- 1 9 ½ inch x 3 ½ inch rectangle from pink floral print for letter E
- 1 6 ½ inch x 3 ½ inch rectangle from pink floral print for letter F
- 1 3 ½ inch x 3 ½ inch square from pink floral print for letter G

Sewing:

Sewing strips from left to right; sew letter A to letter E; letters B, A and F; letters C, A and G; and D to A together. Press according to the arrows. Next, sew the strips together and press according to the thicker arrows.

Suggestion: To make a smaller quilt block, just cut each of the blocks 1 inch smaller for a baby quilt or lap quilt.

Anne Marie's Scrap Tip

Use a sticky note to mark the line on the ruler when rotary cutting. The note does not have to be right on the line, just close enough to distinguish it from the other lines.
